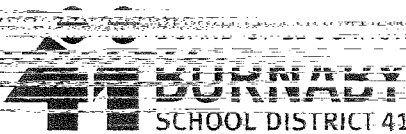





Dear Minister Fassbender:

Re: 2013 K-12 International Education Regional Roundtables

The district was pleased to participate in the International Education Regional Roundtable meeting on March 14, 2013. The Burnaby Board of Education has reviewed the documents regarding several of the recommendations contained in the documents distributed. These documents included the K-12 International Education Strategic Framework & Plan, the Draft K-12 International Education Operations for a Quality Assurance Model, the Draft Semester in BC requirement, and the Draft K-12 International Education Financial Models.

Along with many other school districts in this Province, Burnaby Board of Education has become more cost-conscious. We understand that the government supported these processes that generate revenue to support these valuable programs and services.

The district is concerned about the changes to the annual Financial and Marketing reports to the Ministry. The district has concerns that as part of the reforms, international students were to be treated separately from the regular student body, a practice that this district does not support. The district's students are all treated equally, are regulated by the School Act and all expected to abide by our Code of Conduct and district policies and procedures. The documents distributed at the roundtable meeting mentioned limiting the percentage of international students in a school's population, setting thresholds for some linguistic groups and setting maximum and minimum tuition fees to be charged. These matters raise a number of concerns regarding the district's ability to continue effective management of our programs.

Most concerning, under the new proposal, was the suggestion of a per student payment to the Ministry. The district then becomes a funding source for the Ministry. This would contradict the


concent and spirit of Board revenue generation. The proposal also contradicts the intent of the

Role of International Education, Economic Development & Community Investment Fund in District
"Support the international
education sector's role in regional economic development" and recommendation 7 emphasizes
that it is imperative to: "Minimize policy and procedure impediments to the international

The district has a high concentration of international students and has
through more than 11 years of collaboration with the international education community
human and material resources dedicated to the development of the program. The international
initiatives have created jobs for many teachers and staff, allowed for the development of
educational programs and provide services that have resulted in District students achieving
outstanding academic results.

The Board respectfully requests that your Ministry continue to support the current program and
ask that Boards continue to be allowed the freedom to implement their international education
programs, without new restrictions.

Dear Trustees and the BCSTA Board of Directors:

I am writing on behalf of the Provincial Board of Education and the recent actions of the Board of Directors seem to be taking this summer and the recent actions of the Minister of Education Peter Fackeldey to replace the Board of Directors for BCPSEA and replacing them with public administrator Michael Marshall.

We understand BCSTA to be the Province's Trustees advocacy organization that is intended to represent and advocate to government the views of Boards of Education across the province. As local Boards of Education, we have entrusted BCSTA to be our voice to the government; and to advocate on our behalf for policies that affect public education as well as the importance of elected representation. Recently it seems as though the BCSTA has taken on the role of representing government's views to its membership and even assisting in implementing government policy. This is a new approach for the organization and seems to be a departure from its original purpose of representing the views of its members to the government – one that appears to be merely advisory.

It is our view that BCSTA should have the mandate in other policy or legislative areas to directly co-govern with the government. If there are discussions about changing the association for debate so that a sound strategic direction is developed that results in a true, statutory co-governance model like the model that has been used by BCPSEA.

For Boards of Education to accept a new direction for the BCSTA (BCPSEA) collectively as employers or provincial government is a significant governance with government. To do otherwise is to risk handing over to provincial government a significant portion of our rights, responsibilities and authority.

The Minister of Education, Peter Fackeldey's recent announcement of the replacement of the Board of Directors of BC PSEA and the appointment of a public administrator, Michael Marshall to carry out their duties, are of deep concern to us. However a bigger concern has been the lack of a


public statement by BCSTA defending BCPSEA or protecting their suspension to its critics that the role of Boards of Education as co-governors be advocated for publicly. If the government is determined to continue on its current course, then in anticipation of potential future changes in legislation and new structures in teacher collective bargaining, the BCSTA Board of Directors should still be advocating that the new model include Boards of Education in a true co-governance relationship. To this end we offer the following suggestions:

- The BCSTA lobby government to reinstate the Board of Directors of BCPSEA and operate within the existing structure of provincial administration. BCSTA should have discussions with government to have the reinstated board involved in discussions on items and the length of the agreement while allowing boards to set direction on other matters in a true co-governance structure as has occurred in the past (Provincial Bargaining 2006).

As government moves forward, and the bill is moving for BCPSEA, the BCSTA should immediately start to work on creating a BCSEA board. BCSTA should be established to create the new bargaining model. By doing so, BCSTA will be sending a clear message to the government of the trustees' undivided support for BCPSEA and their elected representatives.

- These are very sensitive times and the need for unity has never been more important. We need BCSTA to be the strongest voice made known to the government. If BCSTA Trustees are united behind BCPSEA, it is important that the role of Boards of Education as true co-governors of the public education system be strengthened. It is also crucial that they retain their rights, responsibilities and autonomy as employers.
