STUDENT PLANNING FOR THE NEXT SCHOOL YEAR!

Students are in the early stages of planning for the 2024-25 school year. Among the options at both the elementary and secondary level are district-wide Programs of Choice. This includes everything from Advanced Placement, such as this AP Biology course, to sports academies and exposure to careers, such as Early Childhood Education. To help youth and their families make informed decisions, Student Planning Nights take place at each high school sharing student options and requirements. This one at Burnaby Mountain Secondary drew nearly 550 people. An information session for those interested in the District's Mandarin Language Arts program was held this month with approximately 50 people at Forest Grove Elementary. Grade 7 students also get invited to a session to learn about course selection for their first year of high school. At this one at Cariboo Hill Secondary, students sampled the DigiPen Game Development Academy – a Program of Choice offered at the school – and electives such as band and drama. More than 700 people attended an evening about District-wide Career Education options, which range from trades to technology programs.

STUDENTS IN THE NEWS FOR THEIR SKILLS AND INITIATIVE

A Grade 6 student at Armstrong Elementary was featured by Global News for her work helping people experiencing homelessness. This is the fourth year that Keanna Lai has raised funds through projects such as a lemonade stand and yard sale. She was able to hand out \$500 worth of food tokens.
